- Fifty-two Foster Grandparents from WAGES have been on campus for morning classes. They rotate through two-week sessions on Spanish, computer skills, and art. This is the 16th year the college has provided "summer school" for this group.

The program allows students to be "co-admitted" to their institutions and have access to resources at both. Students begin their college career at WCC and can transfer into UNCP after completing 30 credit hours.

Williams.
- The Foundation's 2019 **Scholarship Invitational** netted \$197,000 for student scholarships.
